I hope that the Year of Skills will continue on from the Year of Youth, taking with it the lessons learnt and including young people at all stages. The EESC's activities during the Swedish Presidency



 Actively working on the involvement of Organised Civil Society in the implementation and the monitoring of National Recovery and Resilience Plans and the reshaping of the European Semester process in order to optimise the economic recovery following the crises of COVID and the war in Ukraine. This includes work on the Annual sustainable growth strategy and recommendations on the economic policy of the euro area, also building on national contributions



- Contributing to the Revision of the EU economic governance framework for a sustainable recovery and a just transition
- Contributing to the discussion on the possible introduction of a digital euro
- Contributing to the mid-term review of the Multiannual Financial Framework 2021-2027 to ensure, that it and the recovery plan embedded in it can contribute to a sustainable and resilient economic recovery
- Actively working on proposals aiming to introduce a second set of genuine own resources
- Ensuring the stability, integration and resilience of European financial markets, and redirecting
 investment flows to support sustainable growth. This includes recommendations for the Review
 of the European Markets Infrastructure Regulation and on the Listing Act and following up on
 the proposals made for recapitalising EU businesses to support investment
- Contributing to the development of a Social taxonomy for sustainable investment. Feeding into the debate on the benefits and risks associated with crypto assets
- Following closely the implementation of the New territorial and urban agenda, examining
 the challenges in regions and territories with specific difficulties (sparsely populated areas,
 EU islands and mountain areas) and updating the recommendations on macroregional
 strategies
- Combating tax fraud, tax avoidance, money laundering and tax havens. Preparing policy
 proposals on the reallocation of taxing rights and making recommendations on the VAT in the
 Digital Age
